

In 2023, all schools need to implement the NZ Histories Curriculum, and we have been working over the past couple of terms to grow our capability in this area which will be a focus into 2023 and beyond also.

Aligning with this, we will begin using some new language across the school which was highlighted by many community members and staff when community and staff voice was collected earlier this year. From Term 1 we will start to use the local lwi word/kupu for 'Fantail' which is 'Tīrairaka' and 'Tuhua' for Mayor Island. You will also notice some more signage on our buildings which have been gifted to us by our local lwi, Ngai Tamarawaho. We hope to have these up to begin the new term.

2023 will be kicking off with a bang as we will be participating in a Gobsmacked Show. Separate information will come out about this later in the week, but we look forward to lots of singing, dancing and performing for all of our Year 2-6 students to begin Term 1. Our show is called 'Maui the Magnificent'. The main cast has been auditioned and chosen and the links to songs for our tamariki will be shared in the newsletter later this week.

Finally, thank you for all you have done to support us in our work this year. We are looking forward to all that 2023 has to offer and wish you all a relaxing Summer break and will see you back refreshed and relaxed on the first day of Term 1, Tuesday 31st January.

# BURETA ROAD/VALE STREET INTERSECTION SAFETY UPGRADE

Dear parents of Pillans Point school, This is to give you an update on the final design for the new crossings and roundabout at Bureta Road / Vale Street intersection – an upgrade to make it



safer for your children to cross the road here. In this latest design, shown in the image below, both public feedback and discussions with Waka Kotahi NZ Transport Agency were taken into consideration. We are grateful if you provided your feedback and hope that you see your feedback reflected in this design.

#### Proposed changes;

- We are moving the existing pedestrian crossing from the intersection on Vale Street to a
  new location in front of the Countdown car park. To ensure drivers reduce speed on
  approach this is a pedestrian crossing on a raised table. The crossing is not lined up
  directly with the path into Countdown for safety reasons i.e. to ensure people stop and
  look before crossing.
- We will construct two new raised pedestrian crossings which will slow traffic entering the intersection, making it safer for all road users including pedestrians and people who cycle. These will be located at:
- 1. Lower Bureta Road, between the roundabout and the entrance of Countdown supermarket
- 2. Vale Street, on the Grange Road/golf course side.
- To reduce speed on approach we have added raised tables (a raised table is like a speedhump with a flat top that you can walk across) on both approaches at Vale Street and on lower Bureta Road. This has been designed so people who cycle approach the roundabout at a similar speed as a car.
- In this final design, the pram crossing (dropped kerbs so there is smooth access to the
  road for wheelchairs and prams) across the Countdown side of the Vale Street/Bureta
  Road intersection has been removed to encourage pedestrians to use the new crossing
  30m along Vale Street, near the Countdown accessway.

- The extra pedestrian crossings will make it safer and easier for school children to reach the shops and residential areas at lower Bureta Road/Kulim Avenue.
- The new design includes extra lighting to ensure better safety for all modes of transport after dark.
- The new, larger pedestrian crossing on Vale Street, further away from the intersection, will make it safer for students to travel to Pillans Point School and reduces the risk of drivers getting caught by 'sunstrike' impairing visibility at certain times of the day.

#### What's the process from here?

We are currently in the tender process for the project and construction is to start sometime after March 2023. We will keep you informed of a start date and any traffic impacts to expect during construction, this will be once a contractor is appointed and a schedule of work is agreed upon. Construction is expected to take up to three months.

#### What happens during construction?

During construction, a temporary pedestrian crossing will be established outside the construction area on the other side of the Countdown pedestrian entry.

The work will be completed in three stages with Stop/Go traffic in three location

- 1. stop/go is established on the golf course corner
- 2. stop/go moves to the Countdown corner
- 3. stop/go is set up at the Bureta South/Vale Street corner, and traffic is diverted via Seaview Road.

#### **Concerns and Complaints Process**

#### STEP 1

Contact the person involved to arrange a time to discuss the matter privately.

Indicate what the concern is about and let them know if you'll bring a support person to the meeting.

If the concern is about a student, contact the student's teacher (or principal).

Be prepared to listen to different points of view and try to work towards a resolution.

This may require another meeting and/or involve senior management.

Provide feedback as to whether you were satisfied with the outcome, or if the matter is not resolved.



NO FURTHER ACTION REQUIRED

STEP 2

- OR... does NOT involve a particular student or staff member
- you DO NOT wish to approach the person concerned

board member (as appropriate) to arrange a time to discuss the matter privately.

Meet with the appropriate person (as above) and discuss the matter.

Be prepared to listen to different points of view and try to work towards a resolution.

The principal may involve other people to help resolve the concern.

Your concern has NOT been resolved by previous steps

You can make a formal complaint.

See the school's Making a Formal Complaint or Serious Allegation procedure (SchoolDocs).

Include your name, signature, and contact details.

Send to the principal, presiding member (board chair), or deputy board chair/other board member, as appropriate.

Your complaint will be acknowledged.

The school will decide whether a formal investigation is necessary or appropriate. See the Making a Formal Complaint or Serious Allegation procedure (SchoolDocs).

If a formal investigation is required, subject to privacy, confidentiality, or other ethical and legal requirements, the school may keep you informed about the investigation process and timeframes, including confirmation of when the matter is concluded.

NOTE: Unless there are exceptional circumstances, a complaint will not be considered unless the correct process has been followed. You may be directed back to the staff member or principal to follow the process.
